SPRING FUND RAISER

NATIONAL MUSEUM for WOMEN in the ARTS

The long-awaited public re-opening of the museum in Washington, D.C., is scheduled for October 21, 2023. The extensive renovation has taken over two years and included improving access, gallery space, mechanical systems, and the building's structural integrity. Prior to the opening, several events for members and donors are scheduled. Accompanying the re-opening, a campaign, *SPACE TO SOAR*, as been launched to secure the future of the building and its collection, as well as to further the Museum's mission to promote the art made by women. Donors to the campaign will receive invitations to several special events prior to the opening, as well as to have their gifts recognized in the Museum's publications.

WOMEN TO WATCH

The first major exhibition to be presented in the newly renovated galleries will be the seventh iteration of Women to Watch, which will open to the public on April 14, 2024 and close on August 4, 2024. Artists from every part of the world, except Africa and Australia, have been identified by curators Virginia Treanor and Orin Zahra, Mona Cliff, the nominee from Kansas City, will receive a stipend to enable her to attend the preopening and opening events. These include a luncheon/reception for artists and committee members on April 10, as well as an opening reception that evening for the artists and members. Plans to organize a group of members to attend have not been made, but the National committee has suggested that those wishing to attend should make hotel reservations well in advance of the opening. A limited number of rooms at the Sofitel have been reserved, April 8 to April 14, for attendees at a cost of \$439 + tax per night, and other possible hotels in the area have been suggested. The award carries a cash prize of \$10,000.00 and includes an exhibition at the Nerman Museum of Contemporary Art, November 17, 2023 - May 12, 2024. Her "ceramic and mixed-media works capitalize on her imagined relationships between objects and the emotional dynamics of disparate ideas, experiences, objects and textures."
